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2020 EASTER MESSAGE FROM THE GHANA CATHOLIC BISHOPS' CONFERENCE

Theme: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, and with thanksgiving, present your requests to God" (Phil. 4:6, NIV).

Introduction

Dearly Beloved in Christ, as we celebrate Easter, the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, we, the members of the Ghana Catholic Bishops' Conference (GCBC) bring greetings of peace and blessings of God to you our Catholic faithful, Christians of other churches and all men and women of goodwill in our dear country Ghana.

We rejoice and are glad because we are celebrating Easter, the summit of salvation history, the Feast of feasts and the Solemnity of solemnities. During the Easter season, the Church's year reaches its supreme moment in the celebrating of Jesus Christ, who is risen in our human flesh, glorified in that flesh and triumphant over the mortality of that flesh. Christ has indeed risen from the dead and by his resurrection has conquered the power of death, sin, evil and won for us a new life. He is the author and perfecter of our faith. As believers in the resurrection, let us always keep in mind the heavenly dimension of our Christian lives and continually seek to build a risen world, become better people, new people liberated from the shackles of sin, people destined for the life hereafter.

Easter 2020, the Covid-19 Pandemic and the Challenge of Faith

During this unusual moment and time when we celebrate Easter under dire circumstances, it is not unusual for no-believers and even people of faith to begin to ask questions concerning the omnipotence, omnipresence and goodness of God, and to entertain doubts on whether God really cares for His people in the face of much suffering and evil in the world. While we believe that no quick answers would fully and adequately respond to the presence of evil and suffering in the world, we also believe that the presence of evil and suffering in the world does not in any way detract the goodness and omnipotence of God who continues to care for the wellbeing of all people.

We should work together as one common humanity and pray to God to help us to stem the tide and eventually uproot this virus from our midst even as we continue to take all necessary health precautions that will help halt the spread of the disease.

We share in the pain of all in the face of the Coronavirus Pandemic that brings a halt to most of the things we do as human beings. We pray for all scientists, researchers, medical experts that they may find remedy for this pandemic. We continue to pray for those who work at the hospitals and health sectors, paramedics, the security services, the leaders in our world and all who are at the frontline of this pandemic that they may be well protected in the discharge of their duties. For those who have been taken ill because of the virus, we pray for their healing. Finally, we pray for the repose of the souls of those who have passed on as a result of this virus. May the Risen Lord grant them forgiveness of their sins and eternal life.

Easter and the Call to be Each Other's Keeper

As we entreat all to observe the restrictions imposed by the President of the Republic and also follow the precautionary measures laid down by the Ghana Health Service and the GCBC, we crave your indulgence not to leave any stone unturned as we all battle on to fight this pandemic. If Christ died for us, we too should be willing to do what we can to protect ourselves, family members and every Ghanaian. If there is anything that the Covid-19 pandemic has taught us, it is a reminder of our common humanity where there is no distinction between race, religion, gender or status.

Following the successful meetings between the President and the various Religious leaders and leaders of Political Parties in Ghana, it remains our hope that all Ghanaians will unite and collaborate as citizens of our dear nation to do what is expected of us to help contain the spread of the virus in the country. There should be no politicization of the epidemic since the coronavirus has no political colour or preference. As our own Cardinal Peter Appiah Turkson admonishes, "For each person, believer or nonbeliever, this is a good time to understand the value of brotherhood, of being linked to one another in an indissoluble way."

To be each other's keeper also requires that we stop taking advantage of the situation to make more money for ourselves by exploiting others.
